



## UK Seaside and Tropical Islands

### Cornwall or The Caribbean? - Y2 Spring 2

Cornwall is our locality and we learnt about its human and physical features in our previous Geography topic 'Where We Live.' This half term we will compare it to a tropical island in the Caribbean.

Both Cornwall and The Caribbean have a number of similarities despite being so far away from each other! Both have beaches, coasts, hills and forests but their differences include the vegetation, mountains and oceans.



#### Key Vocabulary

<b>beach</b>	A beach is a strip of land that borders an ocean, river or lake.
<b>cliff</b>	A cliff is a type of landform on the surface of the Earth. They are tall, steep rocks that were created by erosion and have vertical (straight up-and-down) faces.
<b>coast</b>	The area where the sea and land meet is called a coast.
<b>forest</b>	A large area filled with many trees is called a forest.
<b>hill</b>	A hill is a landform that is higher than the surrounding land and has a visible summit; they're like mountains, only shorter.
<b>mountain</b>	A mountain is a landform that rises prominently above its surroundings.
<b>sea/ocean</b>	Sea/ocean is a general name for the body of salt water that covers the greater part of the surface of the Earth.
<b>river</b>	A river is a large natural stream of water that flows over land.
