

## Flora Day and Local Celebrations

Enquiry question: Why do we celebrate Flora Day in Helston?

Helston townsfolk have celebrated and enjoyed the wonderful tradition that is Flora Day.

Key Information

This ancient festival is usually held on 8th May. A spring festival to celebrate the end of winter and mark the arrival of the new vitality and fertility with the trees and flowers bursting into life. The houses and shops of the town are decorated with greenery and floral arrangements to express the spirit of renewal.

There is an early morning dance, a children's dance, a midday dance and an evening dance. The Hal-An-Tow is also performed throughout the day.

There are many theories of the history of Flora Day, one being that a "Fiery Dragon" (possibly a large meteorite) is reputed to have appeared over Helston many centuries ago and dropped a large stone on what is now known as the "Angel Yard". More than a century ago, this great stone was split up to be used for building; a portion was built into the outside wall of the Angel Hotel in Coinagehall Street. The inhabitants of Helston, after fully expecting the town to be destroyed, celebrated their deliverance by dancing through each others houses.
